RABBI BEKAH GOLDMAN

Friends,

This year, as in many years, the Hebrew month of Sh'vat straddles two months on our secular calendar. January and February, though situated in the middle of our chilly New England winters, are packed with meaningful moments: the beginning of our secular year, the Birthday of the Trees (Tu BiSh'vat) and Black History Month. One flows right into the next, and as we say goodbye to Tu BiSh'vat and January, we move into February — Black History Month. This is a time when our entire country spends a dedicated month learning about and lifting up the accomplishments of Black individuals and movements. But it is also a time when we can recommit ourselves to the first part of Rabbi Hillel's statement in Pirkei Avot, "If I am only for myself, what am I?"

As Jews, we are tasked to uphold the values of tzedek (justice) and tikkun olam (repairing the world), especially in the midst of this pandemic, which among other things, has shone a light on the significant inequality People of Color experience in American society. This year, Black History Month resonates deeply for me, because Jews around the world are reading Torah portions that focus on our people's harrowing journey out of slavery toward freedom. It was not a quick or easy trek for them and took a miserable 40 years of wandering through the wilderness before they finally could lay their heads down in the land of milk and honey! But what about the journey to true freedom and equality for Black people in America today? Unfortunately their trek has taken even longer! During Pesach, we would say Dayenu! Hasn't it been enough?

During Black History Month, let us remember the plight of our ancestors and let that motivate us to perennially become allies with all marginalized peoples. Let us work together today, as our ancestors did during the Civil Rights Movement, as partners in the fight for social justice, universal humanity, inclusion and equality. May this month — and every month — serve as sacred inspiration for us to use the beautiful stories of the past to craft a future rooted in freedom, diversity, inclusion, equity and beauty for everyone.


In addition, social action donated a Plan B meal to the ABC House. What teenage boy doesn't like a burger and fries!





Great Jewish Books Summer Program

Regenerating Jewish Culture

A hybrid online/residential program for rising high school juniors and seniors, June 20–July 30, 2021.

At the Yiddish Book Center's Great Jewish Books Summer Program, rising high school juniors and seniors read selections from important works of modern Jewish literature and consider how they speak to the opportunities and challenges we face today. Under the guidance of college professors, they consider how the rich legacy of modern Jewish literature can inform us in the twenty-first century.


Although the program's focus is on reading, this is not school in any conventional sense: Great Jewish Books is a lively program full of social, cultural, and recreational opportunities—and no grades—for students who read for the love of reading and who are eager to discover the treasures of the Jewish canon.

New this year, the program begins with five weeks of virtual classes and activities and culminates in a week in-person at the Yiddish Book Center, where students immerse themselves in a lively world of Jewish culture and live in dorms on the nearby campus of Hampshire College.*Program dates: June 20–July 23, 2021 (online), July 25–30, 2021 (in-person)Every admitted participant receives a scholarship for the full cost of tuition, room, board, books, and special events.



Please join the Jewish Historical Society
February 9 at 7:00 PM for a talk by historian Cheryl Greenberg:
"Jews, Civil Rights, and Lessons Learned"



Professor Greenberg will share her reflections on some lessons we can take away from the history of Black-Jewish relations in the 20th century. Over the past year, especially, discussions about white privilege and white supremacy have raised questions about where Jews of European descent fit in. Are Jews white, and if so, how has that affected Jewish involvement in civil rights in the past? How should it inform us moving forward?

Cheryl Greenberg is the Paul E. Raether Distinguished Professor of History at Trinity College, where she teaches African American history, race and ethnicity, and twentieth-century U.S. history. She is the author of Troubling the Waters: Black-Jewish Relations in the American Century. (2006)
