Friends,

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Loel Goldblatt

Dear Friends,

Summer is here, and although it's often thought of as a time for vacation and relaxation, it turns out that it's a very busy time of year for our synagogue planning.



Membership renewal booklets and statements have been sent out and I'm happy to share that as a growing and vibrant synagogue, we are able to maintain dues and fees at the same level as last year. Since it takes more than member dues to sustain our synagogue, we depend on donations from generous donors and our Visionary members throughout the year. For those of you who attended our member picnic in May, please know that it was completely paid for through a donation by a very thoughtful member who wanted to give back to our wonderful community.

Rabbi Gavi is currently very busy making improvements to our Religious School so that it is ready for a great start in the Fall. She's planning to fully engage our religious school students and families in an active, multisensory way along with a new robust curriculum and new technology in our classrooms. We have applied for a grant through the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater Hartford to develop a strong and cohesive approach to family learning. This approach will provide a more consistent curriculum for our Family Education, Art, and Mini Minyan programs and we hope to share good news in the near future about this funding. As Director of Lifelong learning, Rabbi Gavi is preparing to offer numerous adult education programs after the high holidays based on input she's already received from many of you.

Rabbi Bekah and our Ritual Committee are already busily planning for our High Holidays to ensure spiritual and meaningful services, with both in-person and virtual offerings, for all our members. Please let Rabbi Bekah or our Ritual Committee (ritual@fvjc.org) know if you're interested in participating or helping out in any way. Even a small commitment on your part can make a big difference!

Summer is also a good time to review the needs of our aging building and to make necessary repairs and upgrades using funds we've collected through our Capital Campaign. You may have noticed that our sanctuary was re-roofed earlier this year. We've also made necessary repairs to other parts of our roof to prevent leaks. We are going to be replacing all the windows around the sanctuary and social hall and administrative wing later this year. We recently applied to FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) for a grant to provide various security upgrades to our facility. And in thinking of the needs for all who use our building, we've converted one of our restrooms to a safe space for anyone to use as a Gender Neutral Bathroom.

So as you can see, we're building and strengthening our inclusive community in many ways for all our members. One of the best ways to feel that sense of community is by getting involved and volunteering. Be a part of the change and help chart our direction by attending events and volunteering your time. THOUGHTS FROM Rabbi Gavi Ruit

Shalom Friends,

It's been an exciting couple of months in terms of Jewish Education at FVJC

Emek Shalom. I've been meeting with Religious School parents to discuss ways we can improve our school and with other members to hear where their Adult Education interests lie. The feedback has been very helpful!

Religious School: We have exciting things planned for the upcoming Religious School year! The Board recently approved the purchase of a new curriculum for our Religious School. ShalomLearning is a comprehensive, values-based curriculum with a strong Hebrew component that is both engaging for students and user-friendly for teachers. After months of research, it is, by far, the best religious school curriculum I've found. In addition to our new curriculum, our classrooms are also getting an upgrade. Each classroom will be outfitted with a flatscreen TV and supporting laptop. These capital improvements will support the multimedia elements of the ShalomLearning curriculum. I'm very excited about this curriculum and the strong grounding in Jewish values it provides, and I think our students will benefit immensely from this exciting new program..

Adult Education: Thanks to everyone who has given me feedback about topics you want to see in the Adult Education programing. Your input has been very helpful, and I am in the process of developing a calendar of programming that will, for the most part, start after the High Holidays. A schedule of programming will go out towards the end of summer, but I want to put one class on your radar:

Prepare to be Transformed – HHD Preparation

Our sages intended our High Holiday season to be a time of true transformation. It can be a time when we shed the spiritual baggage weighing us down so that we can embrace greater sh'lemut (wholeness) individually and as a community. But such transformation requires preparation – which is why our sages dedicated the month of Elul (the time preceding Rosh Hashanah) as a time of spiritual preparation. In this four-session class, I will guide us through texts that have traditionally been studied during Elul (Psalm 27 and The Palm Tree of Devorah) in order to access greater meaning during this high holiday season. Prepare to be Transformed - High Holiday Prep, Thursdays, 7PM - September 1-22

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Back to the Basics - Thursdays, 1PM - November 3-December 29

Is your understanding of Jewish history, literature, or practice a little rusty? Are you not sure the difference between Nevi'im and Ketuvim (Prophets and Writings) in our Tanakh (Hebrew Bible)? Have you ever wondered the difference between Mishnah and Midrash, or why we're always citing Rashi? This may be the class for you. In this 8-week class, Rabbi Gavi will take us back to the basics. We will be looking at all those things you may have forgotten from Hebrew School: different types of Jewish literature, some Jewish history, and parts of our prayer service. (No class on Thanksgiving)

The Legacy of Lurianic Kabbalah - Thursdays, 7PM - February 23-March 30th

Prior to the 16th century, Kabbalah or Jewish Mysticism was an esoteric disciple understood and pursued only by the scholarly elite. That changed with the teachings of Rabbi Isaac ben Solomon Luria and his followers. Kabbalah, as Luria understood it, became more egalitarian and accessible. Lurianic Kabbalah is a powerfully spiritual theology that was born from the trauma of the Spanish expulsion. In this 6-session class we will look at the foundations of Lurianic Kabbalah and how it continues to influence Jewish spirituality today.

I Asked for Wonder: Spiritual Guidance from Abraham Joshua Heschel Thursdays, 7PM - May 4-June 15

"Abraham Joshua Heschel was one of the great spiritual teachers of the 20th century. A theologian, poet, mystic, and historian, he captured the sense of mystical wonder in a way few writers can do." So reads the description on Heschel's book I Asked for Wonder: A Spiritual Anthology.

In this class we will mine Heschel's Spiritual Anthology for spiritual guidance from the master himself. Heschel takes on nine topics that he sees as central to living a life of wonder: God, Prayer, Sabbath, Religion, Man, Bible, Holy Deeds, The People, and The Land. In this six-session class we will examine how these topics effect our own lives through a close reading and discussion of *I Asked for Wonder*.

(No class on Erev Shavuot)

Queer Quorner - Meets the 4th Wednesday of the Month beginning October 26th, 7PM

Are you part of the LGBTQ+ community and have wondered about the intersection of Jewish life and the Queer community? Then come join us at Queer Quorner! Queer Quorner is a monthly study and discussion group for LGBTQ+ folks led by Rabbi Gavi. Each month we will look at Jewish texts and topics that are relevant to the Queer community.

Adult B'nai Mitzvah - Meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays, 7PM November 2, 2022-April 17, 2024

Did you miss out on having a Bar or Bat Mitzvah as a child? Or do you want to reexperience that trip to the bimah with the added level of meaning that only adulthood can bring? If so, we are starting an Adult B'nai Mitzvah class for anyone who wants to take that journey to the bimah - whether or not you did so as a child. I have found Adult B'nei Mitzvah to be both powerful and meaningful for all who participate. In this 18-month program we will delve deeply into our sacred texts, as well as Jewish history, liturgy and theology, and much more
